West Ways is at a crossroads!

As has been reported over the last year, the newsletter is going ‘green.’ The effective date is July 1.

This means that all subsequent issues can be read on the RWA website - www.rotondawest.org - under the link West Ways Newsletter. It’s all a part of the Association’s cost-saving plan to encourage owners to join the Electronic Communications Program (ECOM).

So far, over 700 owners have opted to read the newsletter on-line and to discontinue receiving printed copies in the mail. In addition to the newsletter, owners will receive billings such as the annual assessment and other documents via email, in place of printed copies.

ECOM could save the Association thousands of dollars in printing and postage costs. But the participation of owners is required.

If you have an email account and prefer to view issues on-line two weeks earlier than the printed copy and in color, take the time now to sign up. It’s simple. Send an email to Manager Jay Lyons at manager@rotondawest.org with your name, property address and account number and request participation in the ECOM Program. Printed copies will still be available for other owners.

One more issue... March/April ...will be printed and mailed before we go on-line on July 1. That is a firm deadline. The cooperation of all is necessary to make this cost-savings program work!

The “Community” section has fourteen information links and the “Association” section has another thirteen.



President's Message

Committee Volunteers - Backbone of the RWA

On Sunday evening, March 4, our legion of volunteers will be honored at our Annual Volunteer Appreciation Dinner - and deservedly so. They devote hundreds and hundreds of hours every year to make our Association tick.

The Rotonda West Association is the largest mandatory homeowners association in the State of Florida with 8,000 lots, over 6,000 owners in all 50 states and 37 foreign countries, and 13,000 residents.

So, it's a tall order to keep the wheels turning to make this a desirable community. Seventy-two members volunteered last year and stepped up to the plate to help a staff of 5 to cover all bases. Thirty-three of the volunteers served on more than one committee in 2011, with Hank Artz leading the pack with 5 committees. Eight members served on 4 committees.

Here's a quick profile of the 11 committees whose volunteers make the RWA tick. Refer to the schedules on page 8 for the time and day of the month for committee meetings.

Administrative/Personnel

Composed of the President and 1st and 2nd Vice Presidents. Reviews performances of staff and recommends salary increases. Reviews and resolves employee issues.

Aquatic Canal System/Drainage

Oversees canal infrastructure for storm water retention, flood control, recreation. Assures adequate water levels, quality/cleanliness, weed control, aquatic life. Works to resolve street and/or drainage problems.

Beautification/Mowing

Main function is to keep the community looking 'beautiful' and upgrading entrances, parks, marinas. Responsible for

mowing contracts of common areas, swales, vacant lots, specialty mowing.

Budget & Finance

Manages the finances, revenues and expenses of the association. Responsible for developing annual budget. Committee members have a strong background in finances, banking, CPA and Accounting and a corporate business focus.

Community Relations

Communications link between the Association and members through West Ways and the RWA web site... www.rotondawest.org. Organizes committee events such as the Christmas Parade, Newcomer Receptions, Volunteer Recognition dinners, Holiday decorations. Interacts with the local media on news of importance in the community.

Compliance

Provides a review process for members through hearings for a fine or suspension resulting from deed restrictions violations and violation of other covenants.

Deed Restrictions

Responsible for enforcement of deed restrictions to protect property. Establishes methodology of consistent enforcement and fining structure.

Election

Establishes election guidelines and conducts the annual election of the Board of Directors.

Policies & Procedures

Prepares policies and procedures that apply to RWA committees.

Residential Modification

All members are required to submit plans for additions and modifications of existing homes or structures under a set of guidelines. This committee reviews each application.

RWA Properties

Maintains, upgrades and improves RWA-owned facilities such as the administration building, gazebo, gazebo bridge and marine docks.

Parade Circle Bike Path Underway

Work was scheduled to begin by early March for the long-awaited construction of the one-mile bike/walking path around Parade Circle for joggers, walkers and bike riders.

Construction was delayed while consideration was given to a proposed \$950,000 project offered by Charlotte County Public Works. It would include a concrete surface, 228 trees, 303 shrubs, benches, landscaping and an irrigation system.

Members of the Rotonda West Municipal Services Benefit Unit (MSBU) challenged the proposal as too costly and submitted a scaled-down plan of its own. The MSBU plan totaled about one-half million dollars less than the County proposal. It includes an asphalt surface less costly and better suited for bicycle traffic, three benches positioned at both ends of the bike path and in the center, with three cabbage palm trees and one live oak tree planted at each bench area.

At a well-attended MSBU meeting on December 13th, MSBU Chairman John Peszko presented his committee's plan and Tara Musselman, County Project Director, presented the County's proposal. By a show of hands, the overwhelming choice of attendees was for the less-costly MSBU plan. The County then proceeded with the design phase in advance of construction.

The bike path will be named in honor of the late Bruce D. Miller. Bruce served two terms as a Director of the RWA and was Second Vice President and Treasurer. He became

a volunteer in 2000 when he joined the staff of West Ways and progressed from there. Before his death from cancer in 2008, he was working with the County on a proposed bike path along Rotonda Boulevard West.

The MSBU committee is working on several other projects with the County. Among them are the installation of sidewalks along Rotonda Boulevard East, Rotonda Boulevard North, and Rotonda Boulevard West. The design phase is about 30% complete and construction is expected to be completed in February 2013. Other projects are new signage at the five entrances, power to bridges, and street lights. The MSBU committee is also working with the County on flooding and drainage issues after heavy rains create problems in Oakland Hills neighborhoods. In addition, RWA President Glynn Perkins, Director Stan Plizga and RWA Manager Jay Lyons met with County officials on the same issue. The County has been slow in providing a copy of a detailed analysis of our community's drainage system to the RWA and MSBU committee.

MSBUs are special Charlotte County assessments to pay for specific projects in communities like ours by apportioning the costs to property owners. The Rotonda West MSBU is a County committee with a working relationship with the RWA Board.

In addition to Chairman John Peszko, the Rotonda West MSBU committee consists of Olga Durham, Scott Schermerhorn, Stan Plizga, Sue Killion and Charles Dodd.

Election Committee Gets Early Jump on 2012 Voting

As members might suspect, the voting process for new directors of the Rotonda West Association takes many months to administer. With this in mind, the Election Committee has already begun its planning for the 2012 election that takes place in the fall.

Last year, with two openings on the Board, just two candidates were on the ballot, contributing to low voter participation. Greater participation is now an Election Committee priority.

The committee is encouraging interested members to give serious consideration to becoming a director and will offer direction. Candidate workshops will be scheduled that will cover the requirements and responsibilities of candidates, as well as newly-elected directors.

The committee is also looking into ways to further simplify the ballot by streamlining the instructions in a step-by-step approach. The committee expects the results will be a more user-friendly process. However, the committee is bound by the requirements of Florida state law governing homeowners association elections.

The Election Committee meets at 1:00 p.m. on the third Thursday of each month at the Community Center. Members are welcome and encouraged to participate.

Peter Traverso is the committee chairman. Committee members are Donna Krabbe, Margie Carroll, Ginni Mahon, Barbara Peszko, Lois Burger, Sue Artz, Fred Warner, and Dick and Joan Duggan.

QuickStart Tennis - New For Kids 10 And Under

Two sports that can last for a lifetime are golf and tennis. And we have both facilities right at our fingertips, with five golf courses and two tennis courts in our community.

Thanks to the United States Tennis Association (USTA) and our own Art Richards, tennis lessons are now available for kids as young as 5 years old. It's called QuickStart tennis and allows kids to start playing immediately, even if they have never picked up a racquet.

Art Richards, an accomplished tennis player himself and a resident of the Broadmoor subdivision, got

the ball rolling by appearing before a meeting of the Cultural Guild of the Greater Cape Haze Peninsula (formerly the Rotonda Community Foundation). Art described the benefits of the program and asked for the Guild's support. Guild officers and members then got behind the program and sought public funding. Enough money was raised to re-stripe and add blended lines to the two courts at the Rotonda Community Park on Parade Circle and to purchase smaller racquets, very low compression tennis balls and a smaller net, all suited to make the game easier for kids to learn.

Kids from ages 5 to 10 are welcome. Lessons are held from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. every Tuesday and Thursday at the Rotonda Community Park courts. Parents can register their children at the Tringali Recreation Center, 3460 North Access Road off SR 776 in Englewood, or call (941) 681-3742. A fee is required. USPTA Pro Tony Geraci is the instructor, representing Charlotte County's Community Services Department. Tony's career is teaching tennis and he has successfully completed the professional teacher's exam.

Art Richards learned the game while in the Army. Through the years, he has played in USTA tournaments and taught the game to hundreds of students of all ages in his native Massachusetts and Florida. He is now certified to teach the USTA QuickStart Program.

Among Art's achievements, he is the recipient of a National Community Service Award by the USTA for giving clinics for students in schools for the deaf. He is now accredited to teach the QuickStart program.

"I just want area youngsters to experience the joys of the game as I have for so many years," Art said. "We hope to encourage many Rotonda West kids to be involved."

Jean Bennett: Re-Inventing Retirement

(Editor's Note: In 1916, the headlines read that the Allies turn back the Germans in the WWI Battle of Verdus, Woodrow Wilson is re-elected President, Charlie Chaplin signs his first film contract, and Babe Ruth pitches and wins 14 inning World Series game. And 1916 was the year that Jean Bennett was born. Here's a profile on Jean, a very busy Nonagenarian as written by Ruth Sargent.)

In the Spring of 1972, Jean Bennett retired from FBI Health Services in Washington, D.C. and settled into her new home in Rotonda West. No doubt she envisioned a life of travel and leisure after building her home in Oakland Hills. "I love to cruise, to travel all around, anywhere," the perky redhead says with a sparkle in her expressive eyes.

As a Registered Nurse, Jean enjoyed a career which spanned from public health to working with private medical practices in obstetrics, orthopedics and other fields. Whatever she chose to do as an RN, it would entail helping people. "That has always been my major satisfaction." Her 'retirement' would follow the same path, volunteering to help people in her rapidly growing new community.

Jean is still busy helping people. She has, in essence, re-invented retirement. Several surprise celebrations of the 95th birthday last July revealed the community's widespread respect and admiration for her contributions to Rotonda West and the Englewood area. She was among the original members of the Rotonda West Garden Club and the Rotonda West Woman's Club. She has been an active member for 15 years at the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 113 where she was Sergeant at Arms and now serves on the Executive Board. "I washed dishes, served as a volunteer waiter - anywhere I was needed."

Jean has been volunteering at Englewood Community Hospital for 12 years - again wherever she is needed. "Although I often worked from the hospital kitchen, setting up and serving patient trays, for example, the most enjoyable aspect was helping patients and families. Staff is busy doing its job and this is where the volunteer comes in. It is one of the most satisfying aspects of being a volunteer."

Jean serves as a Rotonda West Neighborhood Watch base station by telephone two evenings a month, and schedules and recruits Sunday greeters at Faith Lutheran Church. The entire list of her volunteer activity is long and varied but she stresses again, "very satisfying." As a Neighborhood Watch base, she is a vital communication link between the volunteers patrolling the neighborhoods and any possible help they may need along the way. Neighborhood Watch drivers and the residents who may need help know they are not alone out there. "We can immediately contact the police and/or fire department and get them on the scene right away."

Jean Bennett is lauded as a caring and giving neighbor but most of all she is certainly a role model for good citizenship among her Rotonda neighbors.

Canal Maintenance - More Than Meets the Eye

As reported in the last issue of West Ways, the newest addition to the continuing challenge to control the 20+ species of invasive and native vegetation in our canals is the Truxor Aquatic Weed Cutter, Excavator and Dredger.

While our canals were originally constructed as a water containment and drainage system, they have become an integral component of life in Rotonda West. Their restoration and maintenance are a primary concern of our Rotonda West Association.

To this end, the RWA Board of Directors has charged the Aquatic Canal System/Drainage Committee with the responsibility to develop a long-term plan to ensure that the canals would be maintained in the most productive and efficient manner possible. In November 2010, the Board approved a "5 Year Plan for the Canal System" that appears on the RWA web site at www.rotondawest.org/committees under the Aquatic Canal System/Drainage Committee's description.

One major issue identified in the plan is the control of unwanted vegetation (Issue 2.4). The plan identifies multiple approaches for vegetation control, including chemical, biological and mechanical.

The chemicals in use are all approved for use by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and include both liquid and granular forms applied directly to the plant or the surface of the water. Blending the proper chemicals in the proper proportions is critical to ensure a water system that can be used for irrigation and also be a suitable environment for wildlife. In the past, this has been the primary means of vegetation control used in the canals.

The second method of vegetation control is biological. This method involves the use of fish to consume the vegetation. Grass carp have proven to be effective in this area. They too have certain limitations in that they need to be stocked over the years and barriers have been constructed to contain their movement within the canal system. The RWA is working with the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) and the Charlotte County Municipal Service Benefit Unit (MSBU) to implement this program in the coming year.

The third method of vegetation control is mechanical. This method includes the use of a variety of mechanical tools to

cut and harvest the invasive vegetation. This is where the new Truxor DM 5000 enters the picture and is in use by FloridaAquatic, Inc., our canal maintenance vendor. Truxor can operate on land or in the canals and is equipped with a sickle bar cutter attached to the leading edge of a basket at the front of the unit. This allows the operator to cut and gather the weeds in a single process. A second option is the use of another sickle bar attachment that can be lowered into the canal to cut vegetation close to the bottom. The floating debris can then be harvested and disposed of to alleviate the buildup of muck in the canals. The Truxor DM 5000 is also capable of dredging the canal, excavating land, and removing trash from the canal. This and other maintenance vehicles are in continuous use in the maintenance of the canals.

The RWA is pleased to have both the chemical and mechanical means of vegetation control operational. The addition of a biological control through the use of grass carp will round out the canal maintenance program as defined in the five-year plan, and residents can expect even better-looking canals.

Monitoring the Health of Our Canals

Florida Lakewatch is a volunteer citizen program that facilitates 'hands-on' participation in managing lakes, rivers, canals and coastal sites through monthly monitoring activities. The program is coordinated by the University of Florida.

On Thursday, March 15, representatives of Florida Lakewatch will be at the Community Center to give a presentation on our canal system. The meeting is open to the public and begins at 5:30 p.m. Refreshments will be served.

The presentation will demonstrate the need for water sampling, how it is conducted, what is tested, and how

the results are used to monitor the health and well-being of our canals. Water sampling is an integral part of our Canal Maintenance Plan (see related article).

Founded in 1986, Lakewatch currently analyzes water samples from our canals at no cost. Samples are provided by Rotonda West resident volunteers who collect the samples from various points within the canal system. The data generated enables the RWA's Aquatic Canal System Committee to monitor the overall status of our canal system, a vital part of Rotonda.

Kids Give the Homeless Much-Needed Comfort

When a cold front from the north was about to sweep into our area in early January, a group of school-age kids were prepared. Not for themselves but for hundreds of others.

Since September, the young kids had been collecting blankets and warm clothing for the homeless in advance of the cooler winter months, a highly-commendable project.

The temperature would plunge into the 30s on the night of January 8. The day before, 10 members of "Kids Creating Change" loaded up a 16-foot trailer with blankets and clothing earmarked for the Charlotte County Homeless Coalition in Port Charlotte. At the same time, they had gathered 50 blankets for the overnight homeless shelter at St. David's Episcopal Church in Englewood.

The kids are members of the "Kids Creating Change" team that has made a huge impact since their founding in October 2010. They are extraordinary kids doing extraordinary things. Their leader is 11 year old Caitlyn Lovelace, who has spearheaded the effort since the beginning.

In a little over a year, the kids have collected more than 1,000 blankets, as well as clothing items, shoes and personal hygiene products for the homeless in every age group. And many Rotonda West residents stepped forward with donations

on September 24 that was designated as "Rotonda West Collection Day."

Caitlyn and her group have sent a note to Rotonda West residents who helped. It reads - "Thanks to the Rotonda West community, many people are warm this winter because of the warmth in your hearts." signed - "All the kids of Kids Creating Change." Several members of the group live in our community.

At last count, 4,500 families were homeless in Charlotte County.

Inside the Circle - Bits & Pieces From Around the Community

Start of Something?... Peter Traverso, an RWA Director representing the Developer, reported at the February Board meeting that 8 new homes are under construction throughout the community, three in White Marsh and one each in Pebble Beach, Pinehurst, Broadmoor, Long Meadow and Pine Valley. Oakland Hills is the only exception. The 8 new homes tops the total for all of last year.

Honors for Hannah... Hannah Lindsey has been named one of the four recipients of the state-wide 2011 Distinguished Scholastic Award by the Florida Association of Teacher's Education. A 2011 graduate of The University of North Florida, Hannah teaches social studies at Paxon High School for Advanced Studies in Jacksonville. Her parents live in the Broadmoor subdivision. A national champion in gymnastics as a young teenager, Hannah grew up in Rotonda West and is a product of Lemon Bay High School.

World Championship, Close to Home... All boating eyes around the world were focused on Charlotte Harbor in early January. Every year, the International Association for Disabled Sailing conducts a world championship regatta. The IFDS chose Charlotte Harbor Regatta, Inc. as the 2012 host organization and a huge success the event was. More than 100 disabled sailors on 75 boats from 20 countries participated. It took 150 volunteers. Hank Killion of the Pine Valley subdivision played a major role.
