## Charlotte County Emergency Manager Patrick Fuller Speaks on Hurricane Preparedness

Yes, it's that time again! Hurricane season begins June 1st.

On May 18th, the second in the Emergency Preparedness Series sponsored by the Community Outreach Committee was held in the Rotonda Community Center at Broadmoor Park, 646 Rotonda Circle.

Over 100 Rotonda residents heard Patrick Fuller, Charlotte County Emergency Manager speak on the importance of being prepared for the upcoming hurricane season. Early predictions put the expected number of named storms at 13 for this year. Fuller stressed that people need to prepare for each and every hurricane, and not to become complacent. Heed each warning as if the storm will be as intense and dangerous as Hurricane Ian was.

## **Emergency Preparedness Presentation, cont.**

Other speakers at the presentation were David Perry, president of Rotonda Neighborhood Watch, and John Blanchette, of CERT (Community Emergency Response Team).

David Perry spoke on the purpose of Neighborhood Watch, and its continued need for volunteers.

Blanchette stated that the one area in post-storm operations that is in need of improvement is in the area of better communication. He noted the importance of setting up incident command posts to serve as a base for communications.

## START PREPARING NOW FOR STORM SEASON

- Know your evacuation zone.
- Have an evacuation plan ready. Where will you go?
- Keep contact information up-to-date in your phone.
- Check your disaster supplies. Build a disaster kit.
- Refill prescriptions and have at least a two week supply.
- Trim landscaping, and secure or store any object that can cause damage in high wind.
- Stay informed through local news and weather reports.
- Have storm shutters ready and a plan to install them.
- Secure your boat early. Drawbridges are closed after an evacuation order is given.
- Have cash on hand. Have a full tank of gas in your car.

## CANAL CLEAN-UP EFFORT

Rotonda West has 26 miles of canals that are a beautiful part of our community. Unfortunately, Hurricane Ian used our canal system as a dumping area to catch any and all types of objects that were not nailed down.



A special group of Rotonda residents took up the challenge of cleaning up the debris left in the canals after the hurricane. Many people helped out with this effort, and we thank them all. Here are the people who took part in 5 clean-up missions or more: Stephanie Jack, Cindy Chatham, Patti Cowin, Hank Barstow, Bryan Cox, Steve Reed, Bob Carver, FJ Mignagaray, and Larry Lopienski,

and several others. I wish I had kept track. Apologies to those I left out.

Much time and energy was devoted to the clean-up. We spent about 80 boat hours doing the job, so far. Man hours is probably north of 300. We have gone through about 700 dollars worth of fuel, mostly funded by the donations of generous residents of Rotonda West.

The objects retrieved were varied. We have removed large roof sections, soffit parts, tree debris,

pool cages, patio furniture, lots of screen materials often with fish trapped inside that we would release, and many, many porta potties and trash bins. Also, I did retrieval work with my truck in areas that weren't boat friendly.

Many community members living along the canal pulled out debris themselves. The "Team Player" signs helped out with that. When the clean-up crew spotted a "Team Player" sign, they knew that there was debris to be picked up at that location. It helped out a lot with the process of picking up the junk.

Even after 8 months of clean-up, there may still be debris in the canals that need attention. If you have canal debris that needs to be picked up, please call the RWA office (941) 697-6788 and leave a message.

## Book Coming Soon: Eileen Collins Celebrates Daughter Lydia with Inspired Essays

Eileen Vorbach Collins, until recently a Rotonda West resident, is an award winning essayist whose book will be released this fall.

Rotonda West's Eileen Vorbach Collins has a gift.

But it's not a gift that any of us, for an instant, would trade her. She's an award-winning essayist and it's easy to see why. Her essays are inspired. They are thought-provoking, poignant, entertaining, multi-layered, sometimes humorous, and her inspiration is the suicide, now nearly 25 years ago, of her 15-year-old daughter Lydia.

Writing wasn't Collins' immediate outlet for expression of her grief, she says. It took years to reach the point where she could write. A nurse by training, she pursued a master's degree in pastoral care and her thesis focused on suicide bereavement. When she first moved to Rotonda West, she noticed a neighbor had a yellow suicide prevention ribbon on their car and learned they'd lost a grandson. As they spoke, the neighbor pointed out another house nearby. Their son, a veteran had died by suicide. Collins would often see that neighbor, Mike Dalglish walking to bring attention to veteran suicide.

"And here we are," she said, "three families on the same block that have experienced suicide. We could have our own support group and we don't even need a designated driver. There are likely others. It's a tremendous public health issue, but still carries a stigma. Many people are reluctant to talk about it."

Eileen's gift is that she is able to celebrate Lydia's extraordinary self while exposing the illness of depression that robs young and old, of their humanity and even their life, if intervention and treatment is not successful. A few of Collins' essays can be read on her website – <a href="https://www.eileenvorbachcollins.com">www.eileenvorbachcollins.com</a> - and while introducing readers to Lydia's quirky, creative, curious psyche (Eileen's essay *Love in the Archives* does much more justice to describing her beloved daughter's essence), themes center upon a mother's never-ending love and desire to keep those safe within her virtual embrace.

The essay *Hold on Till the Sun Goes Down*, is an amusing recounting of a mother's inability to refrain from worrying about the safety of those she loves, starting with Collins' own mother's cautionary tale of the loss of the tip of her right pinky finger. *In Strong Enough to Withstand the Loss*, Lydia's tending to her deceased grandma's African violets serves as a beautiful, layered, metaphor for the fragility of life.

This fall, a collection of Collins' essays – "Love in the Archives: A Patchwork of True Stories" - will be published in book form by Apprentice House Press. The book is a well-deserved honor. Collins has earned numerous awards for her writing and has been published in many journals and magazines. In these days of tight literary budgets, publishing houses do little promotion of new releases, so any publicity is mostly up to individual authors. Collins declares she's "not very good" at managing her own public relations, but a few minutes reading her short essays is sure to gain an enthusiastic following. Yes, the subject is sad, but no, Collins does not handle the subject in a depressing way. That's the magic of her gift.

In the month of May, Collins and her husband moved "back north," but she remains a member of the Suncoast Writers Guild in Englewood and the Florida Writers Association, which presented her work with two awards in 2022; a Gold Royal Palm Award for unpublished book, as well as first runner up book of the year. Her story about Lydia, *Love in the Archives*, now the title of the collection, received the Diana Woods Memorial Award for creative nonfiction and was published in Lunch Ticket, the Literary Journal of Antioch University, Los Angeles. Two other essays in the collection were nominated by literary journals for a Pushcart Prize.

Despite the accolades and compliments, and as sensitive and creative as Collins' writing is, she declares she is self-taught. Back in 2005, she says, she spent \$2.50 on a used copy of Strunk and White's "Elements of Style" and went from there. When it is suggested that perhaps Lydia is taking a hand in her writing success, Collins tuts and declares that even at 14, Lydia was a much better writer. "I've included an essay, *Because I am a Woman*, written by Lydia in the book and it is the best piece of all," she declares.

It will be a book worth reading.

## REPLANTING THE SHORELINE AT BROADMOOR PARK

One of the sad results of Hurricane Ian is the loss of many shoreline plants in the ponds of Broadmoor Park. Plants along the shoreline and in the water provide important habitat for wading birds, as well as food for fish and aquatic animals. Grasses and rushes provide essential nesting areas for birds, reptiles and small mammals. Without the cover and the food source of shoreline plants, wild-life may be hesitant to return to the ponds of Broadmoor Park.

Shoreline plants also filter out excess nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorus, providing a natural water purification system, which eventually results in clean water to replenish the aquifer. Pollinators such as butterflies and dragonflies are attracted to flowering shoreline plants such as cannas and pickerelweed, adding to the joy of a walk in the park. A planted shoreline will help wading birds such as herons, egrets and anhing a return to the ponds of Broadmoor Park.

A group of volunteers is forming to work with community manager Derrick Hedges to select the plants, choose the shoreline areas to plant, actually plant the plants, assist with watering them, and then periodically check their progress. Weeding out invasives that may show up will be important to the process. Interested in this project? ## Florida LakeWatch Reports on Rotonda Canals

On April 26th, in the Rotonda Community Center, about 50 people were given an update on the overall health of the canals which run through Rotonda West. The presentation was given by Lakewatch Regional Coordinator Daniel Willis and Lakewatch Director Mark Hoyer of Florida Lakewatch, and was sponsored by the Rotonda Aquatics Subcommittee of the Building & Grounds Committee.

A statewide water quality research program which is out of the University of Florida, Lakewatch uses volunteers in a "hands on" approach to assess water quality of lakes, rivers, canals, and coastal sites. The volunteers collect samples and test for nitrogen, phosphorus, and chlorophyll. They also measure turbidity and depth. The data gathered gives an overall biological status of the health of waterways.

Sam Besase, chair of the Building & Grounds committee, and Hank Killion, co-chair along with John House, of the Aquatics subcommittee, opened the meeting with a tribute to the late Stanley Plizga who was a former Aquatics Chairperson, and was involved in the LakeWatch program. The Association also thanked long-time members Bob Winter and Nick Gizzi, who were presented with commemorative paddles. For further information about Lakewatch, visit lakewatch.ifas.ufl.edu.

## Parking in the Median on Rotonda Boulevards

At the April 25, 2023 meeting of the Charlotte County Board of Commissioners there was discussion about, and a decision made on the allowance of parking on the grassy medians on the Rotonda West boulevards. The commission had decided to adopt an ordinance banning parking on certain medians throughout the county. After residents spoke up, it was decided to exempt some of the streets in Rotonda West.

The "catalyst" for the ordinance came after the county decided to protect the planted trees along one roadway's median. According to Charlotte County Administrator Hector Flores, drivers, workers, service trucks, etc. had been using the median for parking and thus damaging the landscaping there. Medians in Rotonda West were some of the sections affected by the ordinance.

Many residents of Rotonda West were unhappy with the proposed rule, which was intended to prohibit parking on medians along Rotonda Boulevards West, North, and East. One resident, Sam Besase spoke up saying, "In the case of Rotonda West boulevards, the proposed rule is counterproductive". His reason being that if the ordinance is passed, then service and construction workers will park in the bike lanes. Besase called the proposed rule a "bad idea for a problem that doesn't exist". Another Rotonda resident, Hank Killion stated, "There are still 20 roofs on that road that need to be replaced". He added, "Construction vehicles will be forced to park in the bike lanes, creating a safety hazard".

The commissioners agreed that the bike safety would be an issue if construction vehicles, service vehicles, and others were to park in the bike lane, and they therefore decided to remove the Rotonda roadways with grassy medians from the no parking ordinance.

John Blanchette, Gulf Coast CERT ERT

Gulf Coast ERT, Inc is a Nonprofit 501c3 company that will fill the void in the aftermath of future disasters along our Gulf and Atlantic coast when communications fail in our communities. Recently after Hurricane Ian, our community of around 8,000 homes sites were out of touch with friends and families for over 10 days. Some communities up to and beyond 30 days. No cell, no internet, no phones, etc. complete blackout. Even with all the destruction from Ian, which was expected, we found lack of communications with the outside world discerning and incomprehensible in our technology centric society.

Gulf Coast ERT with the assistance of a nationally known building and supply chain will buildout two trailers to use initially on the Florida coast as Incident Command and a base for communications reaching out to families and friends via amateur radio service (HAM). We have several HAM operators and enough local volunteers from a nationally recognized charitable organization and Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) to go house to house to as many as we can in our timeframe for wellness checks, gather information and communicate via HAM to those family and friends outside the area their status. Our goal is to be staged and onsite at our sponsors location within 48 hours and sending personal notifications to family and friends shortly after arrival. If we find any injuries, residents not feeling safe or other circumstances, we are CERT trained and can handle many situations and if we cannot, we will be in direct contact with first responders via handheld radios provided to team leads by us and monitored by our Incident Command base. We will also have the tools and supplies to work with volunteers to do light cleanup of areas where we are deployed. Also supplied by a grant from our sponsor.

NOTE: The following 3 pages contain information on how you can help Gulf Coast ERT, which will in turn help our community with better communication in the case of a disaster.

creatic Cancer. It was held at Broadmoor Park and the walk raised more than \$2000.






Saturday, May 13 was the US Postal Carriers food drive. Our club was asked to help serve the volunteers lunch at saint David's Jubilee center.
