2023 Rotonda West Parade: New Time, New Route, Same Christmas Spirit

Besides a new starting time, there will be a new route that's shorter and definitely easier for marching band members and walking parade participants (see end of story). Perhaps, residents will even find the route easier to access. The new theme for 2023 is Santa's Workshop Toys-Toys-Toys. Just as important, there's a new coordinator - Pam Pierce - and she is in need of volunteers with lots of job choices for whatever amount of time you desire to spend.

A professional event planner, Pierce brings years of experience and organizational ability to Rotonda's parade. As owner of the Grand Rapids, Michigan, Events by Design. Her company was the corporate go-to for fun themed parties. After Pierce's retirement and move to Rotonda in 2019, she took on the contract of executing the Barrier Island Parks Society's Green Gala fund raiser. The event, held at the Boca Grande Pass Club. that benefits Gasparilla Island's two light houses, as well as Stump Pass, Gasparilla Island, Don Pedro and Cayo Costa state parks, normally averaged \$30,000 in donations. Pam's last year of involvement was just before COVID hit in 2020 and the gala earned \$90,000.

The success was gratifying, but after that level of intensity, donating her services for a simple, onemorning community event seems like a refreshing change of pace, right?

"It was put out that Rotonda needed a Christmas Parade coordinator. I attended a Community Outreach Committee meeting to mostly fact find and before I left, with a little arm twisting, I took on the role", Pierce laughs.

She already has a three-ring binder of job descriptions and believes that the army of volunteers required can work under three team leaders; the Awards/Judging team leadership has been filled by Tammy Birdsong, Marketing/Public Relations & Logistics/Staging are still available.

"Jump in and volunteer," she urges. "I will support you through all you need to be successful!"

She has also compiled a budget for the RWA Board of Directors which may require some discussion and future identification of funding streams. A purchase of a Mrs. Santa Claus costume is just one of the hoped-for expenditures Pierce believes will make the parade a better experience. She plans to keep records of in-kind contributions so the Board will have a full idea of the value and costs of the Christmas Parade.

She has placed a volunteer sign up display already in the Community Center lobby. "I am hoping to minimize the number of meetings our volunteers will need to attend," she said. "Volunteers can be as busy as they want to be and provide much needed help."

So, whether one wants to be on Elf Patrol the day of the parade and help guide along the parade route, or serve as one of the street performers or costume characters Pierce envisions, there's a job for everyone. Parade entry applications will be accepted, beginning September 1. Entries may register online at Rotondawest.org and look for the Christmas Parade Forms link.

And now, for the new parade route: Fellowship Church, at the corner of Parade Circle and Rotonda Boulevard West, (140 Rotonda Blvd W.) will be the staging location. The route will exit the church lot onto Parade Circle, traveling east to Rotonda Boulevard North and turn north, continuing north to Rotonda Circle. The route will then turn east onto Rotonda Circle to Broadmoor Park (646 Rotonda Circle), where the parade will end.

"This new route takes $\frac{1}{2}$ mile off the old route, which should be easier on the band and parade walkers. I also think the earlier time (10 a.m.) will make the temperatures cooler for parade participants and parade watchers," she explained.

Pierce looks forward to helping get our community in the Holiday Spirit and hopes you will join her in the fun event.

FOOD TRUCK UPDATE and HOLIDAY PLANS

There is an update about the food truck that has been operating at the Rotonda West marina, across from the Hills since last fall. The presence of the food truck was approved by the Rotonda West Board of Directors after Hurricane Ian, as a response to the disruption and unavailability of facilities resulting from the storm. At its meeting on June 22, the Board concluded that recovery from the storm had proceeded to the point that the food truck was no longer needed, and unanimously adopted a motion to end the term of permission for the food truck to operate at the Hills marina, effective June 30th.

However, many people in the community felt that keeping the food truck was good idea and voiced their opinion on the matter. There was still a need, said members, to provide quick, convenient lunches for the local contractors and the many workers who are still here working to get Rotonda back to normal.

UPDATE: In response to the community, RWA President Andy Van Scyoc in conjunction with Fellowship Church, arranged for the Food Truck to be parked in the parking lot of the Fellowship Church on Parade Circle. The truck opened up for business July 1st.

Many community members were happy to continue to be able to still visit the food truck. So were the many local contractors and workers who appreciate the convenience and the good food.

The Food Truck is there Monday through Friday, from 11 a.m.—4p.m.




In other action, the Board announced that a chairman has been found for

SERVICE FOR SGT. AL SACCO HELD IN ROTONDA COMMUNITY CENTER

Sgt. Al Sacco 1965-2023

On Sunday July 30, 2023, a service was held in the Rotonda West Community Center to honor and remember Sgt. Al Sacco of Rotonda West, who recently passed away due to illness.

The Charlotte County Sheriff's Office stated that Sacco was hired in February of 1993, and retired in December, 2022 due to medical problems just months shy of serving the citizens of Charlotte County for 30 years. All achieved the rank of Deputy first Class in 1995, then was promoted to Corporal in 2007, and finally to Sergeant in 2013.

"Sgt. Sacco represented the ideals of the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office," the Sheriff's Offices said in a statement Monday, "and will be remembered for his contributions around the agency and throughout the community." The Sheriff's office stated that throughout his nearly 30 year career, Sacco was a member of Road Patrol, Community Policing, School Resource, and was supervisor in the Volunteer Services Unit.

A devoted family man, Al leaves behind his wife Sharon whom he married in 1999, and two sons, Joseph and Matthew. He also will be missed by his extended family, his friends, and his many co-workers from the past three decades.

"We will always remember AI for his positive attitude and unwavering sense of humor."

RESIDENTIAL MODIFICATION APPLICATION PROCESS IS MORE USER FRIENDLY THAN EVER

Did you know that you can go to Rotonda West association website and complete an application to have your exterior home improvement project approved without leaving the comfort of your home? The process is simple and efficient. <u>www,rotondawest.org</u>

Hard copies of the Residential Modification Application can be found in the administration office at 646 Rotonda Circle or on the website.

If you have difficulty, all you need to do is call the office (941-697-6788) and talk to one of the staff, or email: <u>Tammy@rotondawest.org</u> and we will get clarification or the guidance you need.

Helpful Hints:

If it is alive...flower, grass, plant or tree no application approval is required. *If you want to accent your landscape* project with curbing, rock, shell, or stone you will need an application approval.

The RMA (Residential Modification Application) is not a permit - it is an application for approval from the Residential Modification Committee. Charlotte County issues permits.

Fascia, Gutters, Soffit and Windows no longer require an approval from the RMC (Residential Modification Committee).

Just because you do not see the project listed on the application, does not mean you will not need approval for it - please contact the Association for guidance!

Please remember:

The Residential Modification Committee will not approve incomplete applications.



PROTECTING YOUR HOME DURING STORM SEASON

THERE ARE SEVERAL PRECAUTIONS THAT YOU CAN TAKE NOW TO PREPARE AND PROTECT YOUR HOME DURING HURRICANE SEASON:

WINDOWS:

One of the easiest ways to protect your home from hurricane-related damage is to install storm shutters over all exposed windows and glass surfaces. Shutters can be made from steel, aluminum or heavy-duty materials. Even plywood shutters will provide protection from winds and flying debris.

ROOF:

As we saw with Hurricane lan, roofs are especially vulnerable during a bad storm. Proper roof construction with adherence to the Miami Dade building codes will help with lower category storms. If you are uncertain about the strength of your roof, have an inspector determine if it needs reinforcement.

DOORS:

Many homes in Rotonda have double-entry doors that have one door which remains latched. These doors are especially vulnerable to hurricane winds. The bolts and pins that secure these doors are usually not strong enough to withstand high winds. Treat these doors as if they are windows and secure them with hurricane shutters. Make sure you provide yourself with another way to exit your home.

GARAGE DOORS:

Although your garage may look solid enough to withstand a bad storm, hurricane-force winds can force their way through your garage door, leaving the rest of your home vulnerable to greater damage. Make sure your garage door is reinforced and solid. Retrofit kits are available at local hardware stores.

REMOVE SMALL OBJECTS:

Any loose objects laying around outside your home, have the potential to become dangerous flying projectiles that may cause damage to your home, pool cage, or other outside structures. Spend a morning walking around your home collecting and storing objects that may be dangerous when airborne.

TRIM BUSHES AND TREES:

Cutting back and trimming landscaping can help protect the bushes and trees from extensive damage. It can also help prevent branches and small uprooted plants from becoming projectiles that may damage your home.

ASK THE PHARMACIST

In last month's edition of West Ways, I expressed an interest in meeting with all of you to host an open discussion about pharmacy and healthcare related solutions. Residents were encouraged to email me with topic ideas and thoughts, and here are some questions I received:

What do the letters stand for after your name? What training is required for a pharmacist?

Answer: Pharm.D. stands for "Doctor of Pharmacy". It is considered a professional level degree, similar to that of a Master's. Two years of pre-requisites are needed (unless an alternate Bachelor's or other qualifying degree has been obtained first), followed by four years of Pharmacy School. It is not the same as a Ph.D., which requires several additional years of education, and is more of an academic degree. R. Ph. Stands for "Registered Pharmacist", which means I hold a license for the state in which I practice. I possess additional credentials and state licenses as well.

How do you remember and stay informed about all of the medications?

It's definitely challenging. New medications are released frequently, as well as new indications for older medicines. Many medicines are used for more than one condition. Each state requires continuing education credits every year to remain licensed. I attend courses, read a lot of daily emails, have discussions with peers, and rely on the software at work to help recognize interactions. Learning is a constant, never-ending undertaking. It is not possible to remember each and every medication. Pharmacists rely upon resources and repetition.

What are the differences between generic and name-brand medications?

Every drug is created with two names. Upon release, a new medication is recognized primarily under its brand, or trade name. At that time, it is under patent protection, and can only be manufactured by one company until the patent lapses. This usually spans several years. Once the patent lapses, the medication can then be manufactured by other companies. The cost usually starts to lessen because of the loss of exclusivity. The active ingredients are not necessarily the same and neither is the shape and color. Additionally, there is some leeway allowed for the amount of active ingredient required to be present in the generic version. It may contain anywhere from 85-115% of the active ingredients required for the formulation.

What precautions should be taken to be safe in this Florida heat?

<u>Drink your fluids!</u> I find that many people who live here do not drink enough water. A good guideline is a minimum of half your body weight in ounces of water every day (more in the hot summer months) unless you are on fluid restriction. For each serving of coffee, tea, soda, alcohol, etc., it is recommended to drink an additional serving (8 ounces). Make sure to also replace electrolytes, perhaps by substituting some of that water with sugar-free sports drinks or by adding a tiny amount of sea salt in your water.

Wear sunscreen and reapply liberally— I dispense a lot of medications for patients who affected by skin cancer. Wear hats, sunglasses, and light clothing to protect your skin and eyes. Avoid outdoor activities during the hottest hours of the day, opting instead for early morning walks, rides, and sports.

Follow the news every day to keep an eye on air quality if you have a respiratory condition. Schedule regular maintenance on your air conditioner, at least once, if not twice a year. Set the thermostat to stay at a constant temperature. Running your oven will increase the heat level in your home, opt instead for grilling outside or eating meals that don't require long cook or bake times.


Create a buddy system where you and a friend or family member check in on each other on a regular basis.

The CERT Program educates people about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact their area. CERT members learn to assist others in their neighborhood or workplace following an event when professional responders are not immediately available to help. CERT members also are encouraged to support emergency response agencies by taking a more active role in emergency preparedness projects in their community.

The CERT program is a hands on all-risk, all-hazard training. This valuable 3-day course is designed to help you protect yourself, your family, your neighbors and your neighborhood in an emergency situation.

CERT Training

Disaster preparedness: Instructs team members how to prepare themselves and their community for the various types of hazards that may occur.

Team organization and disaster psychology: Learn to work well in a team setting under stressful emergency event.

Fire safety: Covers proper techniques for preventing and extinguishing small fires.

Medical operations: Conduct triage, establish medical treatment areas, and provide basic first aid for victims.

Basic search and rescue: Learn search and rescue planning, techniques, and rescuer safety.

Terrorism Awareness: Define terrorism, terrorist goals, weapons, and indicators of a terrorist attack.

CERT's Role in the Community

The Charlotte CERT program has a role for everyone. Members use a combination of CERT training and community knowledge to serve their neighbors in a time of disaster.



Charlotte County CERT members serve the community during a disaster as shelter workers, call center operators, and as a support role during wildfires. CERT members also participate in public outreach events, support Fire & EMS by providing first aid at large events and provide lifesaving training throughout the community.

Become a CERT Member

Charlotte County Projects Benefit Rotonda West Residents

FIRST IN A SERIES

Project Description

Provide an additional boat ramp facility utilizing property adjacent to the existing boat ramp. The scope of design is to include a 2-lane boat ramp, kayak launch, additional parking for both vehicles and boat trailers, asphalt ADA parking, and a restroom facility.

Project Location

12560 Placida Road, Placida FL 33946

Project Impacts

The property is on a corner which makes meeting the DOT guidelines for access difficult. After meeting with Public Works to determine access points, the project has proceeded with design of a master plan given the direction that access and redesign of traffic flow within the existing park will need to be considered in planning. This master plan presented to the Board of County Commissioners on April 12, 2022 exceeds the current funding and budget for the project.

Latest Updates

Project is in design development moving toward the direction of a full park development master plan. Master plan includes one large interconnected park, approximately 158 boat trailer parking spaces, 6 launch lanes with boarding piers, centrally located restroom building, ADA accessible kayak launch, pavilions and shade structures, an ice vending machine, and accessibility from Placida Road and Boca Grande Causeway.

Design development master plans were presented to commissioners during a Board of County Commissioners meeting on April 12, 2022. The engineering design team has submitted permit applications for the US Army Corp of Engineers and the Florida Dept. of Environmental Protection (FDEP) based on these approved master plans. A meeting is scheduled with FDEP in early August to review permitting comments.




