## FLORIDA'S SNAKES: SIX WITH VENOM, BUT THERE'S ONE WITHOUT THAT'S A VERY LARGE PROBLEM

There are six venomous species of snakes in Florida, but only one, giant, non-venomous, non-native species – the python – has the wild-life population of the Florida Everglades on its knees. The main species of concern by wildlife experts is the Burmese Python but a second species of concern in southern Florida is the African Rock Python.

On January 9, Charlotte County Senior Land Management Specialist Jason Thompson discussed pythons and other snakes in Southwest Florida and Rotonda West to a crowd of 55 persons.

A snake enthusiast, who even brought along his passive-natured pet red tailed boa named Doc (native to Colombia), Thompson said he believes only **four\*** of Florida's venomous snakes live in Southern Florida. The venomous snakes are:

- \*Dusky Pygmy Rattlesnake
- \*Eastern Diamondback Rattlesnake
- \*Coral Snake
- \*Cottonmouth
- Timber Rattlesnake
- Copperhead

Snakes of all kinds are extremely common in people's yards in Florida and most folks, have walked, unaware, within a few feet of a snake. The preponderance of snakes, even the venomous kind, are beneficial, should be treated with respect and left alone.

The Colombia native snake is a smaller species that appears very similar to the Burmese Python and the African Rock Python that are of great ecological concern to federal, state, and local officials in southern Florida.

Thompson conceded that there have been "periodic" reports of pythons in Rotonda West and Charlotte County for several years that he has been inclined to attribute to pets that have either escaped captivity or have gotten too big for their owners to handle and been released into the wild. Six months ago, however, four juvenile pythons were discovered locally, three of them with umbilical scarring. "It's still possible these came from a breeder," he said, "but it's also possible they were from a loose female python."

The bad news is that under ideal conditions, a female python, in its lifetime, can give birth to 100 snakes a year over a lifespan of 15 years. Last July, a record Burmese Python 19 feet long, weighing 200 pounds was caught in the Big Cypress National Preserve near Naples. Nature relies on a delicate balance of predator and prey. At the giant size of the record Burmese Python, there are almost no predators to protect nature's balance.

While Thompson's red-tailed boa looks like a Burmese Python, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (<a href="https://www.myfwc.com">www.myfwc.com</a>) describes the python in the following way:

The python's markings are tan in color with dark blotches like the markings on a giraffe. Their head is pyramid-shaped with a dark, arrowhead-shaped wedge extending toward the nose. They are semi-aquatic and are often found near or in water. In Florida, they have been found to prey upon a variety of mammals, birds, reptiles, and even alligators.

"Want to avoid a python problem at your house? Don't leave your garage door open. Keep your bushes trimmed up. Don't leave food out for stray cats; be careful what you do because you will occasionally attract a stray guest," he cautioned.

He explained that snakes are ectothermic – they obtain body heat from their environment – and on a very hot day, to get out of the heat, an open garage door will provide an attractive place to get out of the sun. Additionally, boxes, shelves and vehicles can be great places for small animals to hide to further attract snakes seeking something to eat. Similarly, bushes and abundant foliage create hiding places. Compost piles next to the house or food left out for stray animals can also attract unwanted pests. "Don't create a place for them," Thompson said.

Pythons are not protected in Florida, except by anti-cruelty laws and can be humanely killed on private property with landowner permission. The species can be captured and humanely killed year-round without a permit or hunting license. During an informal session following his presentation, Thompson was asked about a recent Rotonda West Facebook post wherein a resident came upon a purported python that was extended across the lane of road ahead. A picture was taken and posted, but the resident allowed the snake to get away. Some responding residents suggested the snake should have been run over. Thompson said running over a snake is not a humane way for it to die. He said snakes have elongated organs and internal damage created by vehicle tires would cause horrible pain to the creature.

According to Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, there is an ethical and legal obligation to ensure nonnative reptiles are killed in a humane manner. A two-step process is recommended by the American Veterinary Medical Association to prevent suffering and to destroy the animal's brain.

Thompson cautioned residents against taking it upon themselves to euthanize pythons. He believes the practice of euthanasia should be left to professionals, as anyone attempting to euthanize any species should be qualified to be 100% certain of its identification prior to taking any lethal action.

## **VERTICAL OYSTER GARDENS**

The Lemon Bay Watch Team of Lemon Bay Conservancy is pursuing their goal of improving the water quality of Lemon Bay through the use of vertical oyster gardens.

The Lemon Bay Watch "Oyster Ambassadors" will be on site at WATERWAYS Paddlesports, 501 W. Dearborn Street, Englewood, Fl. every Thursday, beginning January 18, 2024 through April, 25, 2024, 10 a.m.—1:00 p.m. to provide oyster information, answer questions, and provide free oyster strands to residents who have registered through the site.

Vertical oyster gardens, also known as VOGs, are strings of recycled oyster shells collected from local Englewood restaurants. When suspended in tidal waters, VOGs provide the ideal habitat for young larval oysters to grown into adult oysters capable of filtering up to 50 gallons of water per day.


The vertical oyster garden movement has spread throughout Southwest Florida and has had a positive ecological impact. Studies have shown that not only do they contribute to water filtration and promote cleaner water for healthy seagrass; they provide habitat for a variety of marine animals and fish. The Lemon Bay Watch team is proud to be a part of this water quality initiative that will help to protect and restore the waters of Lemon Bay.

- Home Layout (rugs, poor lighting, objects in pathway)

#### A FALL PREVENTION CHECKLIST INCLUDES:

- Use of Bathroom Mats
- Installing Grab Bars
- Installing Raised Toilet Seats
- Daily Walks
- Use of Assistive Devices (walkers)
- Review Medications

- Update Corrective Vision
- Improve In-home Lighting
- Consider Sleeping Downstairs (main floor)

## ASK THE PHARMACIST Insurance Tips

#### **Greetings Rotonda Residents!**

Hoping everyone survived the holiday season, and is starting off the New Year healthy and happy. My regrets for not sharing an article last month, as the craze of the holiday season caught the best of me.

With a new year almost always comes NEW INSURANCE. Not for everyone, but arguably I would say the majority of us. Every season, I see the same challenges and pitfalls at the pharmacy because of the change of policies or coverage. Here are some tips and pieces of information to guide you for a more smooth transition and ensure you're prepared for your coverage changes:

- -Always carry your new insurance card. And carry ALL of your CURRENT cards. Discard or file away cards from the previous year. Even if your plan "is the same", there may be important codes or information on the card that are needed by your provider.
- -Preview and understand your coverage. What does your policy pay for? How much comes out of your pocket? Do you have a premium or deductible? Please call your insurance plan or speak with your agent to determine this information. Providers give health care services, they do not dictate the terms of your coverage. Prices and copays are not set by the pharmacy or provider. We serve thousands of patients. We do not have knowledge of, nor access to, the information that pertains to your policy.
- -Your coverage can change at any time. A service or medication that was covered last year may not be covered this year. It may not be covered tomorrow. These decisions are dictated by your policy. Your doctor can try to file an appeal with insurance on your behalf called a Prior Authorization. The pharmacy is not involved in the process other than submitting a claim to see if your medicine is covered.
- -If you've misplaced your card or don't have it, and your new information is needed, see if the pharmacy has the means to run a search for your coverage using the last 4 of your Social Security Number. It doesn't always work (especially if you have multiple addresses or last names), but it's a way we can try to help you as a last resort.

Hopefully these tips will serve you as we move along through season.

WHAT IS THE EVENT? Nature Walk and Broadmoor BioBlitz

WHAT IS A BIOBLITZ? A bioblitz is a communal citizen-science effort to record as many species within a designated location and time period as possible.

WHEN IS THE EVENT? Saturday, February 10th at 9 a.m.

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE? Rotonda West property owners, renters, and their guests. All ages are welcome!

WHO IS THE PRESENTER? Jason Thompson, Senior Environmental Lands Manager, Charlotte County

WHERE IS THE EVENT? Broadmoor Park, 646 Rotonda Circle

WHAT EQUIPMENT IS NEEDED? Only your eyes and ears, but using binoculars and some kind of camera or phone will help make identification easier.

ARE THERE APPS THAT CAN HELP WITH IDENTIFICATION? Yes, *Audubon* and *Merlin* for bird identification; *Plant.net* for plant identification; and *Seek* for all species.

### CHARLOTTE COUNTY ITEMS

The 2023 Charlotte County Town Hall on Water Issues is scheduled for <code>9am Wednesday January 31, 2024</code>, at the Charlotte Harbor Event & Conference Center, 75 Taylor St. in Punta Gorda. Attendees shall get an overview of past, present and future water management. Topics will include a brief history of water in Charlotte County, water quality issues, stormwater drainage and management, potable water, comprehensive planning, flooding, sea level rise, and ways that the public can get involved and stay informed on water issues in Charlotte County.

The quarterly Rotonda West Streets & Drainage meeting is at 9:30am Thursday February 15, 2024, at the Charlotte County annex building on San Casa. Please consider attending regarding these key MSBU non-ad valorem tax issues:

- Rotonda Boulevard South Bridge closed for 17 to 36 months (FEMA).
- Rotonda Bridges Repair Cycles (Rebel Road & Rotonda Circle). Perhaps 3 to 6 (of 18) bridges started in 2024.
- Charlotte County Multiple Swale Drainage Issues throughout Rotonda West.
- Road Paving Schedule pushed back to perhaps 2026.
- All Rotonda Bridges are rated at 80,000 lbs. GVW.



- Residents or their contractors are MOWING all the way down to the Ponds, this is not recommended by FWC or SWFTMUD or Charlotte County.
- Residents or their contractors are FERTILIZING all the way down to the Ponds, this is not recommended by FWC or SWFTMUD or Charlotte County.
- Charlotte County Commissioners alerted residents that there is TOO MUCH NITROGEN in local waterways.
- When to Call Charlotte County Public Works (941-575-3600) if:
- Water is threatening to enter your house or garage.
- Deep Water (6 inches or more) is on the roads.
- Water remains in the swale for LONGER than 72 hours after the last rain event.

The Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFTMUD) has recently issued a water shortage order covering Charlotte County. Homes with addresses ending in EVEN numbers are authorized to water their lawns on Thursdays and Sundays, ODD number addresses are authorized to water their lawns on Wednesdays and Saturdays. WATERING TIMES ARE – EITHER BEFORE 10AM OR AFTER 4PM.



## ANNUAL OPEN HOUSE AT LEMON CREEK WILDFLOWER PRESERVE

On Saturday, February 24, 2024, Lemon Bay Conservancy will host its annual Open House at Lemon Creek Wildflower Preserve. The free event runs from 8:00 am to 1:30 pm, and features guided walks on an array of nature topics including birds, butterflies, plants, trees, fish and water quality. The Preserve is located at 3120 Gasparilla Pines Boulevard, Englewood, Florida 34224.

The Preserve is an 80 acre former golf course with numerous ponds, purchased by Lemon Bay Conservancy in 2010 with the goal of providing a refuge for wildlife, and opportunities for environmental education and scientific research. Efforts to improve the quality of water entering Lemon Bay are ongoing at the Preserve, as well as providing habitat for shorebirds and juvenile tarpon. An "Early Bird" guided bird walk begins at 8:00 am, and hourly walks on various topics will continue all day. Local environmental groups will man information exhibits and offer demonstrations of nature projects such as oyster gardening during the day.

The Recreation Center was used by the American Red Cross as a shelter for people left homeless by Ian. The shelter closed on December 15, 2022, and the recreation center remains closed.
