
Master of Ceremonies Sam Besase introduced representatives of each committee, who in turn, recognized their members and told a little bit about their committee function:



#### THE BUILDINGS & GROUNDS COMMITTEE

The Buildings & Grounds Committee is one of the seven standing committees that assist and advise the Board of Directors. As with all committees, it is comprised of volunteers who are appointed by the Board.

#### The RWA website states:

The Committee assists with investigating and recommending the purchase, maintenance, and beautification issues with the RWA property. It reviews plant health and maintenance of landscaped areas, monitors the mowing, and proposes new ways to enhance the beauty, look and feel of our community.

The above website overview is a general, somewhat conservative look at what this committee studies and advises the BOD on. Over the last several years, this committee has studied the proposed addition to the administrative office area. That proposal is currently in the hands of the Board awaiting further action.

Some of the recent projects involving the Buildings& Grounds Committee include: advising the BOD on the continuing clean -up from Hurricane Ian; studying and presenting the proposal for the new parking lot in front of the community center; advising the BOD on the addition of the deck behind the Community Center; working on reviewing bids on the proposed electric sign at the entrance to Broadmoor Park.

Responsibilities extend to the maintenance of equipment used by the RWA, and the year by year plan to systematically replace equipment. The committee also periodically conducts

a cost analysis study, and the feasibility of "contractors vs. in-house" work such as mowing or canal maintenance. A canal maintenance proposal whereby RWA would take over in-house maintenance of canal is planned to be presented at next BOD meeting. The Buildings & Grounds committee includes the Aquatics subcommittee which oversees the health of Rotonda canals, ponds, and the Rotonda River.

Rotonda residents are fortunate to have these volunteers planning and assisting the Board with the many aspects of Rotonda's grounds and the buildings.



### SOUTHWEST FLORIDA HUMIDITY

We love our tropical climate here in Rotonda West Florida, but you may have heard this phrase, "It's not the heat, it's the humidity that will get you." If not managed, our paradise weather can quickly become a disaster for your health, your wallet and your home. The dreaded "M" word (mold or mildew) can be a real problem with our humid weather. Consistent high humidity levels cause problems such as allergies, asthma, increased risk of illness, respiratory irritation, flaking/peeling of paint and the break-down of organic materials such as wood, cotton and leather.

First, we need an accurate reading of the temperature and humidity inside our home. Thermostats can be somewhat accurate, but it's always good to cross check it with a hygrometer; they are very inexpensive and very useful. You can place one in each area of your home to see the consistency of the humidity throughout. So, what is a good %? In SW Florida, it is best to keep the humidity in our homes between 40-50%. According to mold remediation companies, mold thrives in temperatures between 77° and 86°F. If indoor humidity is over 55% for more than 72 hours, microbial growth can begin. This can cause extensive and expensive damage to our home and belongings. To discourage mold growth indoors, humidity levels should be kept below 50%.

So how can we lower the humidity? Here are a few simple tips:

- 1) Ventilate: Moving the air in your home will make the water in the air evaporate much faster. Keep doors to rooms and closets open. You can also lower the temperature of your thermostat for periods of time during the day, keep ceiling fans on low, utilize exhaust fans in bathrooms and the kitchen. Air circulation also applies to attic or crawl spaces. The more ventilation the better when it comes to high levels of indoor humidity.
- 2) Thermostat fan: Up north in colder climates, the fan set to on is beneficial, but here in SW Florida it is best to keep the FAN set to AUTO. What's the difference? Auto the fan only turns on when your system is heating or cooling air. Once the thermostat reaches the desired temp, the fan will shut off until the next cycle. ON means the blower fan is continuously running, circulating air even when your AC is no longer heating or cooling. When cooling, the fan in the on position can cause condensation to form on the coils, creating increased moisture, contributing to humidity, the very thing you are trying to control.
- 3) Have your HVAC system serviced by professionals at least twice a year. They will ensure it is running optimally. Also, be sure you are replacing your filters every 3 months (or as advised by your HVAC company); dirty filters can overwork your unit unnecessarily.
- 4) Indoor plants: They're pretty, but can affect indoor humidity. Only water them when necessary. Generally, plants with large leaves and ones from tropical environments increase humidity, while other plants, such as the Boston Fern, will decrease humidity in the home.
- 5) Damp-Rid: If you are home and able to constantly empty the water that accumulates, then it might be ok. However, if you are a seasonal Florida home owner or away for an extended vacation, Damp Rid is NOT a good idea. The water it draws from the air remains in the container; it is still in your home and there for as long as you are not.

# ROTONDA NATURE WALK FEBRUARY 10, 2024 Article and Picture by: Merrill Horswill

The Rotonda Nature Walk at Broadmoor Park was led by David Smith from Charlotte County Parks and Natural Resources and included a BioBlitz that documented all the plants and animals seen while walking around Farrell Lake. Twenty two participants learned about native plants, invasive plants, butterflies, alligators and birds

using apps such as Merlin for birds, <u>plant.net</u> for plants and Seek for all species. David also recommended using Inaturalist. Volunteers helped with identification. Thirty two native plants were documented including important pollinator nectar plants such as Spanish Needles, Southern Beeblossom, Camphorweed and Coreopsis. Others like Cowpea, Coontie and Dahoon Holly are larval host plants (caterpillar food) for many butterflies. Some non native non invasive plants also help pollinators, like Tropical Milkweed, the host plant for Monarch butterflies. Many Monarch butterflies were seen in the butterfly garden and Southern White and Cassius Blue butterflies were found along the trail.

There are also invasive plants along the trail which displace native habitat such as Brazilian Pepper, Carrotwood and Umbrella Plant. David stressed the importance of retaining native trees and shrubs such as Sabal Palm, Saw Palmetto, pine, oak and willow. He said it is also vital to remove invasive plants to improve wildlife habitat. We saw two 12' long alligators. David said: "To estimate an alligator's length, convert the distance in inches from the tip of the nose to the eye ridge into feet." Seventeen species of birds were recorded in and around the lake including six Lesser Scaup, two Mottled Ducks and 3 Anhingas one Little Blue Heron, three Tricolored Herons, one Cattle Egret, one Great Egret and two White Ibis. Two Kestrels were in trees and 4 Turkey Vultures and 45 White Pelicans were flying overhead. We also saw and heard Common Grackles, Mourning Doves, Blue Jays, Cardinals, Mockingbirds, Palm Warblers along the walk.

Participants thanked David and the volunteers for an outstanding learning and viewing experience. Rotonda Nature will sponsor future nature programs to showcase the flora and fauna in our community and learn how we can become more wildlife friendly. #### Dr. Frank Levin on The Impossible Behavior of Light

At the February 28th lecture held at the RWA Community Center, Dr. Frank Levin once again challenged our minds to join him in looking into the impossible behavior of light. His lecture centered on the question, "How can light act in a wave-like fashion yet also behave like a particle?" Dr. Levin then took us through an evolving scientific and mathematical journey to learn what the great thinkers in history questioned and theorized about the behavior of light. Over hundreds of years using experiments, mathematics,

and building upon what other scientist had learned, great thinkers such as Aristotle, who pondered how light interacts with our eyes to help us see objects, to Isaac Newton, who linked light and vision through what he called "corpuscles" or particles of light, to Albert Einstein, who won the Nobel Prize for his Photo-Electric Effect theory, these scientists brought us to the world of quantum dynamics.

So how can light act in both a wave-length manner and in a particle—like manner? The answer is that electron and photons are quantum objects that behave impossibly, and in a random way.

## AQUATIC PLANTS SUCH AS VALLISNERIA, AN IMPORTANT PART OF HEALTHY CANALS

Vallisneria Americana or tape grass is the most dominant submerged plant in our 30 mile fresh water canals. Healthy tape grass will improve water quality and is prime habitat for all species of fish and other critters. Small fish and fresh water shrimp will hide among the blades of this grass and Largemouth Bass will use it to ambush their prey.

This freshwater plant is the sme plant that is found in the saltwater of Charlotte Harbor. Those residents who fish the shallows of Charlotte Harbor, Lemon Bay, and the many other local sounds and bays know the importance of Vallisneria for the health of our loval saltwater fishery.

Since our canals discharge over a dam into Lemon Bay, it is important that we maintain good water quality in Rotonda's waterways. The Aquatics Sub-committee recognizes the importance of Vallisneria in its canal management plan that calls for cutting and harvesting, while leaving a center channel open for navigation. Prior to 2010, the plant was killed and allowed to rot depleting dissolved oxygen and allowing algae to grow.

## LOCAL BIRDERS EXCITED ABOUT WIDE VARIETY OF BIRDS AT BROADMOOR PARK

On a crisp morning at the end of January, twelve local birders were drawn to Boardmoor Park after a sighting of over twenty ducks, the Lesser Scaup, on Farrell Lake. Sometimes called Bluebills, the male has a glossy purple head, and a striking black and white body. The female is brown with a white patch around her bill. Both have a grayish blue bill. Possibly there were a few Greater Scaup in the flock, but they are much less common. Over 250,000 Scaup winter in Florida in lakes, ponds, estuaries, in Lake Okeechobee and Tampa Bay. The ducks breed in Canada and feed primarily on aquatic invertebrates such as clams, snails, shrimp, crabs and a variety of insects.

After a two hour walk and a tally of the amazing assortment of birds viewed that morning, the group's sightings were posted on an eBird checklist. Over 36 species were identified, and 219 individuals were noted. The shoreline produced a Tricolored Heron, the Little Blue and Great Blue heron, White Ibis, Anhinga, Cormorant, Red-Breasted Merganser, and a wood stork.

Above were a Red-Shouldered Hawk, two American Kestrel, two Bald Eagles, a flock of nine White Pelicans, and our resident Osprey. Mourning Doves, Northern Mockingbirds, and Blue Jays were plentiful. Northern Cardinals, Loggerhead Strikes, and Red-Bellied Woodpeckers were present in large numbers.

Building and Grounds Chair Sam Besase was given the details by walk leaders Susy D'Hont and Ken Blackshaw. Sam asked for a copy of the birders' results, and stated that the plantings that "RWA has planted in and around the ponds and throughout Broadmoor Park are influencing the increase in the number of birds. Birds, wildlife, nature and flora are in abundance in the Park."

In the past year, native yellow cannas, wood sage and cardinal flower have been added to the shoreline. These plants provide cover for shore birds and allow tiny fish and invertebrates to thrive, providing food for wading birds. Wax myrtles, damaged in Hurricane lan, are making a comeback. Red oak and bald cypress have been added to the pond by the community center. A butterfly garden is thriving, and monarchs can be seen around the many milkweeds.

A Nature Walk with a focus on birds will take place on Saturday, March 30, 2024 at 9:00 a.m. in Broadmoor Park.

#### CHARLOTTE COUNTY ITEMS

The Charlotte County Commissioners met on Tuesday February 27 and the first topic on their agenda was the Rotonda Blvd South bridge and the ongoing battle with FEMA regarding costs. The Charlotte County Commissioners passed a motion to write a letter to FEMA demanding their consideration of the Charlotte County detailed 100-page engineering plan vs FEMA 3–4-page sketch drawings.

The issue is money: \$312K – FEMA vs \$1.2M Charlotte County.

In addition, on Wednesday, February 28, 2024, I met with Congressman Greg Steube's personnel and reiterated the importance of the RBS bridge being completed and asked for his support in the battle with FEMA. This is the 3<sup>rd</sup> time that I have solicited his support on the RBS bridge issue.

The 2023 Charlotte County Town Hall on Water Issues was held at <u>9am Wednesday January 31, 2024</u>, at the Charlotte Harbor Event & Conference Center, 75 Taylor St. in Punta Gorda. Resident Leo Van Orden attended presented was an overview of past, present and future water management. Topics included a brief history of water in Charlotte County, water quality issues, stormwater drainage and management, potable water, comprehensive planning, flooding, sea level rise, and ways that the public can get involved and stay informed on water issues in Charlotte County.



The quarterly Rotonda West Streets & Drainage meeting was at 9:30am Thursday February 15, 2024, at the Charlotte County annex building on San Casa. Please consider attending regarding these key MSBU non-ad valorem tax issues:

- Rotonda Boulevard South Bridge closed for 17 to 36 months (FEMA).
- Rotonda Bridges Repair Cycles (Rebel Road & Rotonda Circle & high end of Annapolis & Caddy at Rotonda Circle and Cape Haze Drive). Perhaps 6 more bridges (of 18) might start in 2024.
- Charlotte County Multiple Swale Drainage Issues throughout Rotonda West.
- Road Paving Schedule pushed back to perhaps 2025.
- All Rotonda Bridges are rated at 80,000 lbs. GVW.
- Residents or their contractors are MOWING all the way down to the Ponds, this is not recommended by FWC or SWFTMUD or Charlotte County.
- Residents or their contractors are FERTILIZING all the way down to the Ponds, this is not recommended by FWC or
- Water remains in the swale for LONGER than 72 hours after the last rain event.

The Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFTMUD) has recently issued a water shortage order covering Charlotte County. Homes with addresses ending in EVEN numbers are authorized to water their lawns on Thursdays and Sundays, ODD number addresses are authorized to water their lawns on Wednesdays and Saturdays. WATERING TIMES ARE – EITHER BEFORE 10AM OR AFTER 4PM.
