RWA ANNUAL MEETING & IN-PERSON VOTING THURSDAY, DECEMBER 5, 2024, 6-8 p.m.

By now, many of our residents have already mailed in, or dropped off their ballots to the drop-box in the office. If you have not voted as yet, hopefully you are planning to attend the RWA Annual Meeting on December 5th and visit the in-person voting station, located in the lobby of the Community Center. This voting station will be open from 6 pm until 6:45 pm. You will not need your blue absentee mail-in ballot, different ballots will be provided for in-person voting.

Residents will be deciding on two important issues. First, is the Building Addition to the Administration Office. There will be no increase in your HOA Fees.

Second, is the Rollover of Excess Membership Income over Membership Expenses as provided by IRS Ruling 70-604 (See page 3 for rollover explanation).

The meeting will reconvene after the voting to announce the results of the vote.

PLEASE EXPLAIN "ROLLOVER OF EXCESS RWA HOA FUNDS" WHICH APPEARS ON THE BALLOT EACH YEAR

Property owners are asked each year as a part of the RWA election process to VOTE either YES or NO to rollover excess funds. Here is Geoffrey Lorah's (RWA's outside independent CPA auditor) explanation:

- 1. Common interest realty associations (primarily condominium and property owner / homeowner associations) are organized as not-for-profit corporations. For operating purposes, it is assumed the annual budgets for these associations will be prepared on a break-even basis, meaning expenditures will equal revenues. When an association has excess member revenue in any given year, there are three basic options available to the association regarding the treatment of the excess revenue:
 - A. Refund the excess revenue on a pro rata basis to the members of the association
 - B. Obtain member approval to "rollover" the excess revenue to the subsequent fiscal year
 - C. Retain the excess revenue and report this revenue as taxable income on the association's Federal and/or State tax return
- If the members do not approve the rollover of the excess revenue, an association has two options regarding the treatment of the excess revenue; either refund it to the members or report it as taxable income.

Please note: This is a general explanation. The rollover process is primarily based on the requirements of IRS Revenue Ruling 70-604



RWA COMMUNITY GARAGE SALE A SUCCESS!



Coyotes Are Adaptable, Shy, Elusive

Coyotes are adaptable, if nothing else. They exist in each of Florida's 67 counties, as well as Rotonda West, said Kalvin Bernard, land manager for Charlotte County's Parks and National Resources Division.

Bernard told about 25 residents on November 6, he spends his days on the job "counting birds, fish and turtles," but he has seen very few coyotes in Charlotte County. Shy and elusive, coyotes avoid human interaction so can be hard to spot although they're definitely present.

For those unfamiliar with coyotes, they look similar to dogs but are related to wolves. They are smaller than wolves, weighing up to 44 pounds and standing up to 4 and a half feet. Life in the wild is hard for a coyote – their lifespan is about three years. In captivity, they can live up to 18 years.

Whereas wolves live in packs of up to 30, often

for their entire lives, ruled by a tight hierarchy of alpha and beta males and females, a coyote pack is very different.

The purpose of a coyote pack is primarily to raise the four to seven puppies born to it. Their pack is much smaller with the females staying put and the males often leaving by age four to five months. Coyotes are much more solitary beings

and often hunt alone.

The adaptability of coyotes is illustrated by the multitudes of habitats where the animals are able to survive. Take a Florida habitat and coyotes are able to survive there. In addition to neighborhoods, they can be found in flatwoods (open canopies of pine trees, scattered shrubs and diverse ground-cover of grasses and wildflowers), swamp (flat wetlands such as the Everglades) and scrub (old dunes with deep fine sand soils that are excessively drained). A former tortoise burrow or a felled tree might serve as a nest for a female coyote to give birth.

The wide range of food types is also evidence of the adaptability of coyotes. Their eating habits are omnivorous and opportunistic. They'll eat small animals (rabbits to rats), iguanas, frogs, snakes, fish and berries. Coyotes can be a nuisance and will grab dog and cat pets if they are unattended, but they do perform a role by controlling the population of palm rats and other smaller mammals.


Bernard cautioned that residents can avoid pests by minimizing garbage and not leaving their garage doors open. Even bird feeders can attract coyotes because they will eat birds, as well as the inevitable pests that prey on birds.

Neither does he recommend people approaching a coyote. And if a coyote approaches a person, "try to get away," he counseled. "Make noise. If you are with your pet, snatch the animal up and try to retreat." The large olfactory receptors of a coyote make pepper spray an ideal defense for individuals and pet owners.



CHARLOTTE COUNTY NEWS ITEMS

As you can imagine, Rotonda BRIDGE work has been delayed a couple of months due to the recent series of Hurricanes (Debby-Helene-Milton).

The next 6 bridges work should now start in February/March of 2025 and be completed by the end of the 2nd quarter of 2025. Thus, at that time there should be 10 of the 18 bridges completed. It takes approximately 8 weeks to complete repairs and maintenance per bridge. Traffic shall be maintained. Please observe posted construction/detour signs.

- Rotonda Bridge #014101:
 NEAR 517 ROTONDA CIRCLE-Between Fairway Road & Mariner Lane
- Rotonda Bridge #014107:NEAR 727 ROTONDA CIRCLE-Between Long Meadow Lane & Marker Road
- 3. Rotonda Bridge #014104: NEAR 563 ROTONDA CIRCLE-Between Broadmoor Lane & Sportsman Road
- 4. Rotonda Bridge #014100: NEAR 407 ROTONDA CIRCLE-Between Fairway Road & Mariner Lane
- Rotonda Bridge #014063:NEAR 211 ROTONDA CIRCLE-Between Bunker Road & Mark Twain Lane
- 6. Rotonda Bridge #014060: NEAR 45 ROTONDA CIRCLE-Between Caddy Rod & Annapolis Lane
- 4 completed 14* more MSBU bridges to be completed.

The construction work schedule for the bridges over the Rotonda River at ROTONDA BLVD NORTH and ROTONDA BLVD EAST and ROTONDA BLVD WEST shall be provided by Charlotte County at the December 14, 2024 MSBU meeting.

These 3 bridges are paid for by the Charlotte County GAS TAX fund, NOT paid for by this MSBU.

*The latest news on the Hurricane Ian damaged ROTONDA BLVD SOUTH BRIDGE is that in April of 2024, the Charlotte County Commissioners wrote a letter to the US FEMA Director in Washington DC, asking for her review and expedited resolution for this bridge. Also, Congressman Greg Steube is engaged in resolving this issue between FEMA and Charlotte County. NO NEW NEWS!!!

The issue is money: \$312K - FEMA vs \$1.2M Charlotte County.

I am in continuous follow up in person and by phone and email on this topic with the Charlotte County Commissioners. There is no additional news yet.

Later in the 2nd-3rd quarter of 2025, 5 more Rotonda bridges shall begin the bidding process and work on these 5 bridges shall be later in 2nd half of 2025.



- Bridge Rehabilitation #6 Bridges 014105 and 014106 Weiler Engineering Corp. will soon present 100% design plans.
- Bridge Rehabilitation #7 Bridges 014100, 014112 and 014123 Request for design bids in progress.

TRAFFIC LIGHT: The intersection of Gasparilla & Rotonda Blvd East is slated for a traffic light. There are supply chain issues, therefore, the traffic light (being paid for by the new highend RV park), is about 6 to 9 months from installation (~spring 2025). Charlotte County has issued a purchase request to interested bidders.

The 14 streetlight poles on the 4 bridges over the Rotonda River have been repaired/replaced. RBN & RBE & RBW & REBEL COURT

The next quarterly Rotonda West Streets & Drainage meeting shall be held on Thursday December 19, 2024 at the San Casa Charlotte County facility. The last MSBU meeting was cancelled due to Hurricane Milton.

• The Paving Schedule for the 70 plus miles of roads here in the Rotonda West MSBU shall probably begin in the 2nd half of 2025. GREAT NEWS!

Road and Bridge gas tax paving -- The Board of County Commissioners approved the award of the paving contract in September of 2024. Rotonda Blvd North, Rotonda Blvd East and Rotonda Blvd West along with Parade Circle shall be paved probably in 2025. Standard crosswalks will be installed. If the advisory board desires stamped asphalt crosswalks instead, the MSBU would pay \$35,600 or about \$4 per property. 9,000 properties x \$4 = ~\$36,000.

- All Rotonda Bridges are currently structurally sound
- Rotonda West bridges (all are over 40 years old), they are rated at 80,000 lbs. GVW.
- Residents or their contractors are MOWING all the way down to the Ponds, this practice is not recommended by FWC or SWFTMUD or Charlotte County.
- Also, Residents or their contractors are FERTILIZING all the way down to the Ponds, this practice is <u>not recommended</u> by FWC or SWFTMUD or Charlotte County.
- Also, residents are leaving their GRASS CLIPPINGS in the roadway, this practice is not recommended by FWC or SWFTMUD or Charlotte County
- Charlotte County Commissioners alerted residents that there is <u>TOO MUCH NITROGEN</u> in local waterways.
- The RWA canals are in good shape per water test samples taken monthly by the RWA Aquatics group.



The Charlotte County Commissioners met recently regarding Proposed MSBU Rates for 2025. There are 2 MSBU's (Municipal Services Benefits Unit) that apply to RWA residents:

- 1. ROTONDA WEST STREETS & DRAINAGE MSBU:
- 2. WEST CHARLOTTE COUNTY STORMWATER MSBU:

The MSBU rates for both of the above MSBU's here in the Rotonda area shall remain the same – NO INCREASE IN MSBU RATES FOR 2025.

Swale Drainage Issues: We had a wet summer! From June – August, <u>43 inches fell.</u> Then Tropical Storm Debby and Hurricane Helene and Hurricane Milton!

Charlotte County advised that the plan is to put a segment of Greenbelt out for bid for swale ditch maintenance. From there, the County can estimate what the entire sections would cost to remediate and then create a multi-year budget to do so. That would mean an increase in MSBU rates probably in 2026.

Drainage Pipes to be lined in advance of paving:

Rotonda Blvd E @ Crevalle Road near Fiddlers Green, line from catch basin to canal – done

- Rotonda Blvd E @ Cape Haze trail head line road crossing pipe done
- Sunnybrook Blvd @ Greenway Ave line double barrel pipe in progress.

There are <u>DOZENS</u> of open drainage work orders in Rotonda West. Public Works will get to all of them. These are a few that I have asked about lately.

NATURE WALK AT BROADMOOR PARK NOVEMBER 30, 2024





Informative nature walk led by Dr. Bill Dunson in Broadmoor Park, Rotonda West

Dr. Bill Dunson led a group of 31 participants in a nature walk in Broadmoor Park on a cool Saturday morning. The group discovered many native and non native plants, a dozen species of birds and even two small alligators on the banks of the ponds. Dr. Dunson discussed the pond edges that had been mowed to the water's edge and poisoned, eliminating beneficial native plants which are habitat for all species of wildlife. He suggested it's better to encourage native plant growth to support the pond edges rather than leave them bare, which will lead to erosion. He compared that to another pond with intact willows, which made a buffer on the edge, creating a habitat supporting wildlife. He said mowing in general is mostly unnecessary, not doing it is better for wildlife and saves money. People were interested in the Butterfly Garden and noted monarch caterpillars on the milkweed. Dr. Dunson said every yard can be a mini habitat by planting wildlife friendly plants in gardens and pots and leaving areas wild. We can all do our part to help biodiversity!



Wednesday December 11, 2024 2pm

Sea turtles are among the oldest creatures on earth but they are now threatened by ever-increasing pressures from a staggering array of sources as human populations grow, coastal habitats are developed, and marine habitats are degraded.

Sea turtles are keystone species that play critical roles in maintaining the diversity and the health of our oceans. There are seven species of sea turtles. The flatback lives only in Australia. The rest, the green, hawksbill, Kemp's ridley, leatherback, loggerhead and olive ridley are found in US waters and all but olive ridley are found in Florida. Sea turtle populations are being negatively impacted by many human-related factors. ingestion of or entanglement in plastic pollution, fishery longlines, gill nets, trawls and discarded personal-use fishing gear, destruction of sea grass by motor boats. Nesting areas are being lost by coastal development and increasingly

extreme weather events, hatchling sex ratios are now frequently imbalanced due to changes in beach temperatures. As a result, sea turtles are protected under the U.S. Endangered Species Act and are greatly in need of our help! Florida citizens have both the privilege and the duty to be responsible stewards for these endangered species.

For the first time he had to admit he was tired. "I think the word is exhausted," he said.

Well, the show must go on. Saturday night he and his wife Pauline were running at full throttle. About 15 boats were decorated and ready to go. Pauline had her hands full trying to find room for those who had requested space on a boat. Space was so tight that there was no room for Pauline who had to stand for the entire boat trip.

But both were pleased with the success of the night and plan to do it again.
